### HISTORICAL HALIFAX TOUR, JUNE 2ND - FROM 9:00 AM TO 12:30 PM

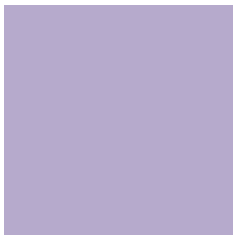
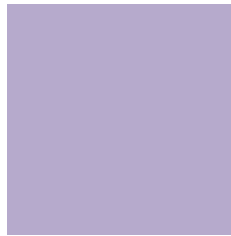
This history and anecdote-filled ride through the streets of Halifax will introduce you to one of North America's most unique and captivating destinations. Hear of the days of rumrunning and privateering, Halifax during the war years, the *Titanic* connection, and the exploits and heroism of the citizens that lived through the devastating Halifax Explosion in 1917. Your kilted guide, will this excursion, which includes stops at Fairview Lawn Cemetery, the Halifax Public Gardens and Citadel Hill National Historic Site.

### LUNENBURG AND MAHONE BAY, JUNE 3RD - FROM 9:00 AM TO 3:00 PM

Commonly known as "the prettiest town in Canada", Lunenburg has recently been named one of the world's few UNESCO World Heritage Sites by the United Nations. Settled in the mid 1750's by Germans and Swiss, its citizens still retain one of the most interesting accents in North America. Now a bustling fishing port, Lunenburg was once considered to be the busiest shipbuilding town in the world, and was the birthplace of the world-famous racing schooner *Bluenose*. The town's distinctive architecture and extraordinary scenic beauty is a colourful reminder of maritime heritage. While you are in Lunenburg you will enjoy a delicious lunch at the Old Fish Factory Restaurant.

Afterwards, we will have a walking tour conducted by local historian, to learn the fascinating folklore of Lunenburg's past and present. Highlights of this downhill stroll include the Lunenburg Academy, the details of the UNESCO designation or a visit to the interesting Fisheries Museum to learn about the history of fishing in Atlantic Canada.

On the return drive to Halifax, a brief picture stop will also be made in Mahone Bay, famous for its picturesque scene of three waterfront churches. You will love this tour along the beautiful South Shore.
